Minister's Letter

Has your year started well? I always think that after all the sparkly lights and celebrations of Christmas, it's nice to have a bit of a quieter, darker, more hibernating time at the beginning of the new year. Nevertheless, the short dark – and often rainy and stormy - days can also dampen our spirits a bit, particularly when the news from around the world are quite dark, too.

I don't know about you, but I have been finding recent events – both here in the UK and elsewhere – quite heavy and worrying. There is a lot to worry about, with chaos created and fears kindled by wars and threats over conquering lands, by discrimination.

Nevertheless, we cannot let that dishearten us, let our courage be taken away. In our services, we have heard a lot about the early days of Jesus' ministry over the past weeks: all guided by the principles of love, of justice, of righteousness: standing up for what is good and right.

There have been lovely reasons for encouragement, too: babies born and families preparing for the baptisms, couples preparing to get married, the joy we see in our church community – in all the celebrations around Christmas, at coffee mornings and other gatherings.

Again, nature shows us that even in the darkest days of winter, there is brightness: the astonishing displays of the *aurora borealis* in our night sky, snowdrops and aconites and crocuses determinedly pushing their way through the mud to burst into new life.

Nothing is ever as dark as it might seem, and darkness is not the final word: haven't we just at Christmas celebrated that the light of the world will always shine brighter than any darkness, that this light will never be put out?

The days are getting longer, there are a few minutes of additional brightness every day, the first lambs will soon appear in the fields. Nature keeps renewing itself, and even in the darkest days of winter, it is preparing itself, gathering new strength for spring.

Whatever may be happening in the world, whatever messages of perceived threats and of fearmongering we might hear: we can't let that darkness take over, we each can hold up a light to examine it, to decide whether we'll let it frighten us, or whether we'll prefer to nurture the light of God's love, and let it shine brighter, whether we'll prefer to let our life be guided by what is good and what is right.

I wish us all a bright and hopeful spring!

Lammermuir Church Property Update

February 2026

Yester Kirk

Heating

The work carried out to determine the future viability and satisfactory heating of the church using the existing pellet fed boiler has been completed. The initial work involved procuring the services of a qualified consultant funded by the Church of Scotland General Trustees, and a survey by a specialist engineer. The reports from both indicated that the boiler could provide a minimum level of comfort and should be serviceable for a further 10 to 15 years. Alternative options were considered, but all presented their own difficulties, and it was decided that retaining the existing boiler, was the best option. Modifications and upgrades of the boiler have been commissioned and completed. The boiler has been achieving and maintaining acceptable temperatures for services and other meetings during January and early February. The existing iron pipework and radiators will need to be replaced as part of the Church interior upgrade.

Interior Upgrade

It was considered essential to resolve the heating issue before progressing with detailed work on the upgrade, as that would have a significant bearing on proposed alterations to the layout of the interior of the church. The Fabric Convener is preparing an initial proposal document that will be sent to a few potential Project Managers. It is hoped that an appointment can then be made, and detailed work can commence on proposals for the upgrade. When these are finalised and costed, they will be presented for approval to the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. Update on progress will continue to be included in future newsletters.

In the next few weeks, the church property group are proposing to visit several other churches that have been recently upgraded, to observe and learn from their experiences.

Saltoun Church

The moveable fittings in Saltoun church have been cleared, and the building is scheduled to be handed over to the purchasers on 16th February. Lammermuir church will continue to have a presence in East Saltoun, using the Session Rooms/Tithe Byre that we own on Main Street.

Bolton Church

The sale of Bolton church is progressing through the legal stages.

Foodbank collections

At the end of November, we collected a record amount of 95kg of donations for East Lothian Foodbank. All donations help local families in need and are very much appreciated. Our next collections will take place on Sundays 29 March (for Lammermuir Larder) and Sunday 28 June (East Lothian Foodbank).



First Aid course

At the end of January, twenty keen “would be” first aiders attended a session led by Margaret Stobie from the Lothian Community Event First Aid organisation, in the Fletcher Hall. It was a “Save a life” event and included CPR and Defibrillation awareness. It was a most informative evening, and Margaret has said she would be willing to do another session, covering other medical emergencies, later in the year.



We plan to have an emergency response plan for each of our buildings, so that we can respond quickly and confidently in emergencies. Many thanks to Margaret and her team.

Messy Church

Our first Messy Church of the year takes place on Sunday, 1st March, from 4 to 6pm in the Village Hall in Gifford, where we'll be thinking about celebrating spring and the promise of new life at Easter. All children of pre-school and primary school age are warmly invited, together with their parents, grandparents or carers. We'll have crafts and a toddler corner, games and a story, and a shared supper for the children. We have a great team preparing these events, and it would be wonderful to have more families join in.



The next Messy Church after that will be on Sunday, 10th May, 4-6pm in Garvald Village Hall. We'll explore the story of Daniel in the Lions' Den. Further Messy Church events will take place on Sundays, 23rd August (East Saltoun) and 15th November (Humbie).

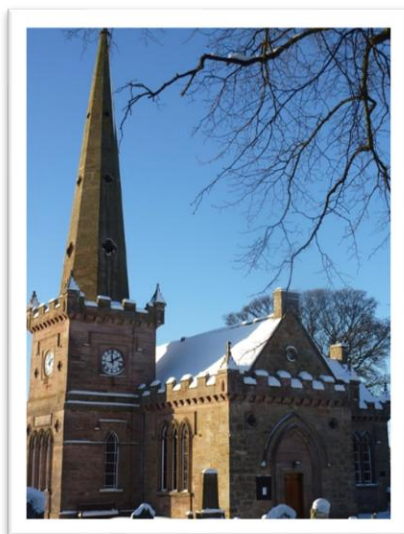
Service themes

Up until Easter, we will follow various Lent themes in Matthew's gospel and use Matthew's passion story in detail for our evening services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. After Easter and until Pentecost, we'll continue the disciples' story in John's gospel and the book of Acts. Over the summer, we'll go back much further, to the books of the Pentateuch – following well-known characters from Adam and Eve to Abraham and Sarah and their descendants, all the way to Moses.

Closing service for Saltoun Church

On Sunday 18 January, we held a Service of Thanksgiving and Leave-Taking for Saltoun Church, as it is now being closed as an active church, and entering a new phase of its life. About 120 people came together for this closing service, including former organists, couples who got married in the church, and elders who have since moved away from the parish. 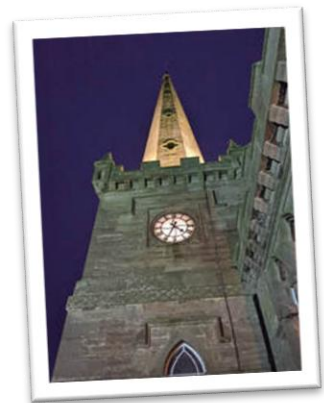
East and West Saltoun remain very much part of Lammermuir Parish, just as the other villages that no longer have active church buildings. It is heartbreaking to have to close buildings like Saltoun Church, that have been at the heart of the community over such a long time, and where many important family occasions were marked. However, along with congregations across the country, we can no longer maintain church buildings in every community, because of the decline in membership and income of the Church of Scotland. As a church congregation, we need to cover all costs of the buildings ourselves - maintenance and repairs, insurance, and of course all running costs, without any external or public funding. There have been so many changes in society, which over the past 70 years have also brought a steady decline in church attendance and membership with it. However, we have a strong congregation with a committed membership across all the villages in the parish, and our remaining church buildings in Gifford and Humbie, as well as the Session Rooms in East Saltoun and the Stables in Garvald and Humbie are well used throughout the week. By concentrating our resources on fewer centres, we can serve our community better,



and we see how new friendships and a sense of a united congregation continue to flourish in the parish.

In the service, we heard that the first church building in Saltoun was consecrated in 1244 and dedicated to St Michael. It belonged to the Abbey at Dryburgh, to whom the lands and rights in Saltoun had been granted about 100 years earlier. Since the Reformation in the 1560s, Saltoun belonged to the Presbytery of Haddington and the synod of Lothian and Tweeddale. Records show that there has been a minister here since 1568. We heard of Patrick Scougall, minister at Saltoun in the 1650 and 60s, who later became Bishop of Aberdeen, and Gilbert Burnet, his successor, who taught Andrew Fletcher, the Patriot, and later became Bishop of Salisbury, with a seat in the House of Lords. We heard that between 1636 and 1855, 3,933 baptisms took place in Saltoun, about 18 per year, as well as 1,188 weddings, on average three per year. Archived Kirk Session records show that in the 1640s, the session appointed elders to 'visit the toun' at the time the sermon was preached, to discover who was absent from public worship. Particular concern was expressed about people who were found in alehouses during the Sabbath.

One striking entry records in 1719 that a formal proclamation by the King, against immorality, vice and profaneness, was read aloud from the pulpit. There are also frequent references to collections for the poor, payments for widows, or small sums given to individuals "in necessity." In the early 1700s, a collection was held for the Reformed Churches of the great Dukedom of Lithuania, by order of the General Assembly, for repairing churches which had been ruined 'by the sword and famine'. The current church building was built in 1805. Its spire is said to be the highest in East Lothian at 99 feet high - thus at the time on spires of 100 feet or over.

Besides the historical records, we also heard of more recent memories of the days when the Tithe Byre across the road was open every Saturday and Sunday for coffees and the sale of baking, plants and crafts, with a tithe going to the church. We remembered many of the people involved at the time. We remembered Sunday School nativities (including the ones with angels toppling off their box) and outings to Gullane Beach, where John Wilson, the minister at the time, would play the children down from the bus with his bagpipes. We heard about fantastic flower arrangements provided by

the community for weddings and funerals, about a West End choir at a recent wedding service, about baptisms, and about a few struggles with the ringing of the church bell, even by our Session Clerk John. The children's choir led by Mrs Louden, the then minister's wife, and repairs to the church roof by some of the church members were recalled with fondness.

In a prayer, we gave thanks for the community that has made up the church, and looked to the future, using these words:

For all the saints, who, in times past
and present,
have formed a congregation of your
people
and have met in this place
to offer their prayers and praises to
you,
we praise you, Creator God.

For those who came here as children
to learn of you and to be received
within your covenant of grace,
we praise you, Creator God.

For the young who have grown in you,
and matured in you,
and have been challenged by your
claims,
we praise you, Creator God.

For those who have come together in
marriage,
have rejoiced in your gift of children,
and have learned to know you better
in learning to love each other more
truly,
we praise you, Creator God.



For those who have taught in Sunday
School,
and for all who have learned
from one another and from you,
we praise you, Creator God.

For the ministers, elders,
members of Boards and committees,
for musicians and choir members,
for members of the Guild, of societies
and groups,
all who have given their time and
talents
for the work and worship of this
church,
we praise you, Creator God.

For the knowledge that your church
continues
and that the work of the people
of this congregation continues,
we praise you, Creator God.

For the common life of this congregation,
for the special occasions and the ordinary,
for joys and sorrows, opportunities and challenges,
for all these things and more,
we praise you, Creator God.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit:
as it was in the beginning, is now and will be for ever.

We pray for this congregation of your people:
help us to know that when we leave this place
we do not leave your presence;
and when we go out from this building,
we do not leave the Church.
And now, in the unity of faith,
in the communion of saints,
in love and goodwill to all,
in remembrance of those
who built and maintained this place,
we dedicate ourselves anew
in the service of your kingdom;
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

While we sang the words of a blessing: 'May the God of peace go with us, as we travel from this place', symbols of our church life at Saltoun were carried out of the church, including communion silver presented to the church by Gilbert Burnet in the 1600s, the baptismal bowl, and the pulpit Bible. Willie Logan, one of our oldest members, summarised the morning very well: 'This is a sad day, but we need to carry on and look forwards'. Well said, Willie - we look forward to continuing the church life we are

building up across our wide parish area now as Lammermuir Church, and we carry on with all the activities happening throughout each week, and our services on Sunday, now held at Yester and Humble Churches.



Making and sharing stories

There is a picture hanging on the back wall of the Session Rooms in East Saltoun. This A2 canvas, created by the Sunday School many years ago, depicts an historic city, its outline in pen and ink, over which vibrant colours have been 'blown' through straws. The 'blowing' of paint was carried out with much exuberance and enthusiasm as befits the joy and celebration in the Bible story the picture symbolises. For this is Nineveh - at the culmination of the Jonah story, when, if you remember the song goes, "We all had a wonderful party, and Jonah had a whale of a time".

There is no legend attached to this picture. Without explanation or title, it looks like a rather messy kids' creation with no particular reference point. Once we know the background the picture comes alive with meaning. Considering the energy and joyful abandon with which the children embarked on this activity brings another layer of emotional connection to the piece. We can see and feel the spirit of the piece.

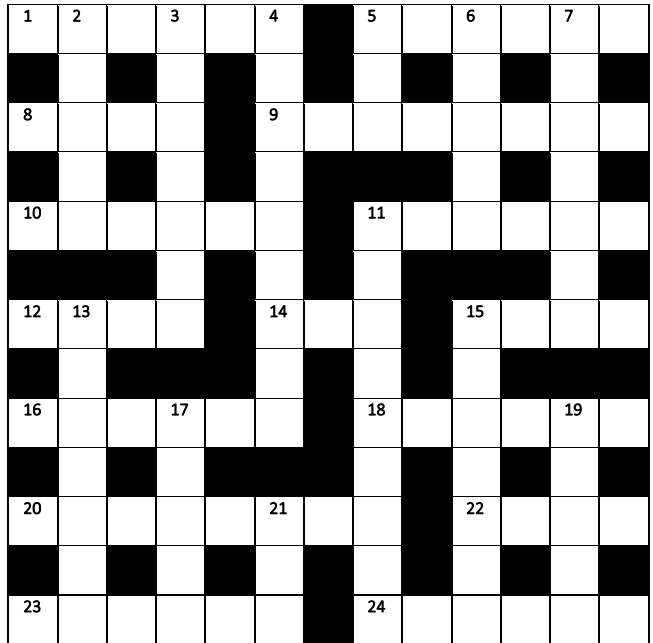
Recently we have seen two of our beloved churches close, our final services dedicated to telling their stories and celebrating all the life events that have happened within their walls. Whilst these services were infused with sadness at the loss of these two wonderful buildings they were also crammed with remembrances of times shared, baptisms, weddings, funerals and many other less ceremonial events: stories of deep friendships, camaraderie and fellowship. It has been this rich human experience held within these sacred spaces, which has enriched us and all who have entered their embrace.

Sharing the backstory of the painting gives meaning and understanding. Sharing our stories, remembrances and talking honestly of our emotional attachment to our churches, and all that they avail, has brought a deeper sense of understanding of each other and the paths we have walked. My hope is that we can continue to make new stories, new artworks, new connections and encounter enriching experiences along the way.

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Remap update

At Christmas 2024 our Church had a collection for the work of Lothian, Fife and Forth Valley Remap, who provide custom-made equipment free of charge for disabled people. Paul Wightman, secretary for the Lothian, Fife and Forth Valley Remap group has written with an update of some of the projects that the money our church raised has gone into. Here are some of them:



A client had scleroderma and secondary Raynaud's which affected her fine motor skills, and she couldn't open the seat belt clasps on a car seat and pram for her new baby. "Nutcracker" squeezers were 3D printed to allow her to release the clamps. (left)



A man who had Cerebral Palsy since birth with right side weakness, reduced arm length and much reduced walking ability, needed support to continue walking. A rollator was modified to have an extended right-hand handlebar, together with a modified brake so that both brakes could be operated from the left and side. (right)



A woman who had no left hand beyond the wrist wished to have a means of riding her scooter. A 3D scan was made of her stump, and a pocket to match the stump was 3D printed into a shape that could be fastened to the handle bars. (left)

A man requested a stair barrier for his disabled wife. She had balance issues and had previously overbalanced at the top of the stairs. A simple bar and brackets were added to the head of the stairs, affording protection and simple operation. (right)





A professional cellist suffered a spinal injury and was paralysed from the chest down. Confined to a wheelchair, she was unable to position her cello normally, as it would slide across the floor due to her wheelchair requiring it to be leant over at too steep an angle. A raised base with a pocket for the cello spike was built, together with a tether to prevent it sliding away, allowing her to continue playing. (left)

A man who enjoyed archery suffered a spinal injury and was unable to continue his hobby unless seated. Commercially available stools did not provide the strength and stability for his posture. A purpose-built lightweight aluminium base was designed to accommodate him. (right)



A woman who was a keen knitter had a stroke and lost significant use of her right-hand side. A table mounted frame was designed to hold, position and adjust a fixed knitting needle to allow her to knit one-handed. (left)
